Our Keynote speakers

Tomas Colbengtson



Tomas Colbengtson is Saami, born and grown up in the small village Björkvattnet in Tärna, at the border of Norway and Sweden. In Tomas' artwork, he asks how colonial heritage has changed indigenous lives and landscapes, both of the Saami and other indigenous peoples. Struggling to revitalize his mother tongue, South Saami language, he works with visual art, using Sami history and collective memory as the source to his art. His work with printed art on different materials that cast shadows can be read as a metaphor for governmental invisibility of Saami people and culture. In his art Tomas seeks to assemble a language to formulate the loss but also rejuvenation of Saami identity. Questions that are global and affect everybody in one way or another. Colbengtson is initiator of one of the first art residences for indigenous artists *Sapmi Salasta* 2018.

Eva Maria Fjellheim



Eva Maria Fjellheim is a South Saami researcher, communicator and cultural worker. She holds a PhD in Indigenous Studies from the Centre for Saami Studies at UiT - The Arctic University of Norway, where she has researched resistance to wind power as a form of green colonialism in South Saami landscapes. She is interested in creative and ethical methods for how knowledge can be built and communicated across disciplines and in society at large.

Annika Pasanen



Annika Pasanen works as a professor of Sámi sociolinguistics at Sámi allaskuvla, the Sámi University of Applied Sciences. Pasanen has both researched and actively participated in revitalization efforts among various Indigenous and minority peoples, particularly in Sápmi and the Arctic regions of the Russian Federation. She has focused on, among other things, language nest activities, adult Sámi language learning, and strong models of language learning in schools and kindergartens.
